Woodland Schools originated in Europe – post WW2 – through lack of classroom space.

It is a long-term child-led, educational process that promotes, observes and explicitly supports the social, emotional and physical development of children, young people and adults in an outdoor, preferably woodland, environment.

Woodland schools empower children and promote growth in all areas of learning listed in the table. They empower children to take responsibility and to be independent learners. They offer the children the opportunity to use/transfer their learning into the outdoors whilst scaffolding as they start to explore and learn in a less structured environment.
